 Washington -- In the dry, stuffy atmosphere of a hearing room, House Judiciary committee members set out to understand the nuances of *teen* culture and what leads youngsters to commit *violence*.

In an unusual scene, three *teen*-agers took center stage last week as leadoff witnesses, commanding the attention of powerful lawmakers in a jam-packed room.

"The *media* plays an important role [in youth *violence*] but not an overly dominant role," said Brian Pick, a student at Maine South High School in Park Ridge, Ill.

But in an unexpected twist, Mr. Pick faulted the *media* not so much for fictional depictions of gratuitous *violence* but mainly for presenting unrelenting news coverage of the Columbine High School shootings and similar tragedies.

Carly Celmer, a student at the private Our Lady of Lourdes Academy in Miami, added: "It seems the only way to make Page 1 or the front page is to do something wrong -- not right."

The students agreed, however, that continued exposure to violent television shows, movies and video games has desensitized youngsters to the consequences of *violence*.

Ms. Celmer said she doesn't understand why she can't purchase music with explicit lyrics but can easily buy a video game that allows her to rip someone's heart out.
